Category A

Challenge, support and intervention plan (CSIP)

of violence.

PIPE Psychologically informed planned environments (PIPEs) do not

provide treatment but are an important element of the pathway for prisoners with personality disorder. PIPEs are specifically designed units which support prisoners to maintain behavioural change and make further progress in addressing offending behaviours through planned and structured activities. Staff on a PIPE have additional training to develop an increased psychological understanding of their work that enables them to create a supportive environment, which promotes the development of prisoners living there and facilitates

progression.
