


We commissioned the services of 'User Voice', a national charity, created and run by people who have been in prison and on probation, to interview black and mixed heritage boys, to gather their perspectives on the services that they had received from the youth offending service (YOS). User Voice prepared a report summarising their findings, methodology, direct quotes from the boys and their suggested solutions.
